He gets along with most other dogs, doesn't notice cats or seem to care, and, depending on the weather, decides if he wants to walk or would prefer to take himself to the yard and "run" back into his kennel when done. her age, she would not find a home quickly enough. Shelters were full, and we had just had an adoption, so we met Lucy and we knew she was a good girl and we could help her. She is great with other dogs, people, pretty much anyone and anything. She has a lot of pep in her step, and loves walks, playing in the yard, and just hanging out. If you have another dog and are thinking of a second, Lucy could be a great match. She is housebroken, and will be spayed soon as she had been in heat when we took her into our care.

Starla (below) came to us from an inner-city pound facility where she had been surrendered along with her older "sister." They had most likely been living outside a



good part of the time as evidenced by fly strikes on her ears. Despite this background, Starla seems to be housebroken and is very responsive. The poor girl was suffering from entropion, a condition where the eyelids curl into the eyes causing irritation and pain. Thankfully, RBARI, a rescue/shelter in Oakland with whom we work to rescue dogs, took care of her eyelid surgery and spay! We think she must have not been treated very nicely, as she flinches as if she's been hit before, and it takes her a bit to warm up to men. She is not at all aggressive, just cautious initially. But she warms up quickly and is a very friendly girl. She is very food motivated and will sit before she is even asked.

Adorable cuddle bug Nori (above) got her name after being rescued during a Nor'easter, living as a stray on the streets of Newark. Nori is gentle but a little shy. She loves to snuggle in bed and to be petted, but because of her rough start she gets nervous in loud or chaotic situations. Her ideal home would be with one or two other cats, a couple/single person with time to give or a family with teenage/college aged children.

Tia (right) was trapped for TNR in Livingston, but was far too sweet to go back. A nice couple purchased a house that came with a backyard surprise: three unvetted cats, left behind by previous owners. Tia is extremely gentle and purrs nonstop when you give her pets and attention. She is an 8- year-old gorgeous long-haired kitty (don't be fooled by her summer hair cut), is up to date on vaccines, fiv/felv negative and spayed. She loves other cats but



is no fan of dogs or very loud noises. She enjoys playing in cardboard boxes, eating temptations treats and sleeping in her cat tree.

This is **Rudy**, a 14-year-old black long-haired cat. He recently lost his home when his pet-mother entered a nursing home and couldn't care for him any longer. Rudy ended up in a shelter where he was placed in a small cage and subject to the barking of many dogs. He was so traumatized that he licked the fur off his legs. A PAWS representative heard about him, pulled him from the shelter, and is now fostering him. Rudy has two marks against him for being adopted. First, being a black cat. Second, he is an aged cat and somewhat skittish. He was examined by our veterinarian and in spite of everything he's been through was found to be in overall good health. He's adapting to living in a home again now.

Rudy's situation is not unique. More than a half million pets are orphaned each year due to a pet-parent's death or disability. Many are taken to shelters to await an unknown fate. Please arrange for your pet's welfare should you no longer be able to care for them. Provisions for their care can be just an agreement between family or friends (preferable written with signatures) or can be included in your will, which can include a pet trust that provides for the expenses for their extended care.

Sweet and so eager to go with us, she proved to be an amazingly lovable girl, good with everyone. After we had her treated, she was adopted by Lisa who had adopted Macy from us years before. Unfortunately, Macy had passed away from an aggressive cancer, and Lisa knew she had to save another pittie. Sage is living the life, glued to her mom Lisa, and we couldn't be happier for them!







Axel (above) spent a long while waiting at AHS Newark for rescue. It only took us one meeting to know that he was a gem. A large boy, he had been surrendered after spending most of his time in a yard. This boy right from the start showed amazing love and sweetness, and Jon and Kelly fell in love with him immediately and welcomed him into their home. Axel has been the best boy they say, and they could not imagine life without him!



Lulu (above) came to PAWS from a crowded NJ shelter when one of our fellow rescue partners reached out to us to see if we could take her. Her sweet and playful nature was immediately evident, and when Will saw her post, he came to meet her and was smitten, as was Lulu! She now lives with Will and his daughter and is exactly where she wanted to be, surrounded by a loving family.

We met **Bub** (below) at a crowded NJ shelter and knew we had to pull him — sweet and loving, Bub was adopted by a couple and is their shadow, traveling with them everywhere he can go!

More Medical Stories Many thanks to our long-term fosterers!

The animals PAWS rescues often require extra medical care and longer stays. You've already read some of their stories throughout this newsletter. There also are special situations where we need to rely on a foster home that can commit to keeping an animal for an extended period of time, often for the lifetime of that animal. We are so grateful to have these special fosterers, and want to recognize them for their compassion and care of these animals.

Vance's Story

Vance was one of those dogs we took in, many years back, through a volunteer who had been helping a homeless person find a place for his dog when he needed to move from his parking lot home into a shelter. Vance, already an adult pit bull, had always been with his person, so this transition was very tough for him. At the time, we were leasing a space in Jefferson, NJ where we had set up some large indoor enclosures for 5 of our dogs, and Vance came to us to stay there. He was very anxious, not doing well there, and had a fairly lengthy stay with us until we were able to get a wonderful fosterer, Brianna, to take him into her home and work with him. She found him to be a great companion, and he flourished with her. From there, a couple applied to adopt Vance, met him, and it seemed to be a good match.

After several years, the couple contacted us because after their first child was born, Vance was showing discomfort, and with the birth of their second child, they decided Vance needed to be rehomed. We took Vance back into our care. At this point, we were sheltering some of our dogs in Stirling at Elizabeth Ann Kennels since the property we once had was sold. Vance at this point was a senior, about 11 or 12 years old, and he settled into life at the kennel as best he could. We walked him daily and spent time with him, but of course it's not the same as being in a home.

Luckily, in stepped Rich, one of our great foster homes. His foster dog had just been adopted and thankfully, he offered to take Vance. Vance has absolutely mellowed into a very comfortable life with Rich, and Rich has taken amazing care of him. When Vance had a major health issue a few months ago and *needed a splenectomy in order to survive*, we were all nervous of the outcome since Vance is now about 15, definitely showing signs of old age, but thriving in the care of Rich.



These are the cases we often manage, and they are "behind the scenes" but they are a good part of who we are! We cannot say enough great things about our amazing foster homes as they have literally saved many lives.

Sammy's Story

Another long-term foster, Sammy, came to PAWS several years back, already in his early senior years, with many issues including a heavy load of heartworms. We figured even though he was a little older, because he was so sweet and lovable, once we had the heartworm disease treated, he could be adopted into a home. The first foster home was unable to keep him due to his constant



urinating, so we had him rechecked and took him back to the kennel where he did well, having access to outdoors most of the day, though he would continue to drink and urinate very frequently. Another foster home came to meet him and decided to try fostering to adopt. Unfortunately, they lived in an apartment on the second floor, and with all of Sammy's "potty" issues and needs, and his constant search for water

anywhere he could find it, after several months with sad hearts they had to relinquish him back to us. So back to the kennel for Sammy. He was walked daily, loved by all who worked with him, and doing pretty well.

Meanwhile, through all of this, we had our vets working on what could be the cause of Sammy's issues. We ended up putting him on meds that finally seemed to calm his obsessive disorder and when Patty and her family came to meet him, they fell for Sammy and we arranged for them to foster.

Sammy has been with them for well over a year and a half and has become very attached to Patty and the family. Recently Sammy started *suffering from what seemed to be chronic pain, and after emergency care, and extensive veterinary care, he is finally responding to the new medication and will live out the rest of his life with Patty and her family.* We don't know what the future will hold, but he is where he wants to be and is loved beyond words. We are forever grateful for these compassionate and amazing people who step up to do a tough job!

Sweet **Chloe** had been surrendered to a rural shelter where her only way out was through rescue. When we took Chloe into PAWS, she had several odd-looking skin growths hanging from her body in different places, which our vet completely removed and biopsied. Unfortunately, they were all found to be low grade mast cell tumors, and a consult with an oncologist was suggested.

The treatment plan outlined required a span approximately 6 months and included weekly, then twice a month, trips from the kennel in Stirling to PetCure Oncology in Clifton where Chloe received ultrasounds, chemotherapy, and follow ups. The staff was so compassionate and Chloe did extremely well through it all. Subsequent visits have shown Chloe remains cancer-free.

And then a wonderful thing happened: Alexandra and John, who had had experience with having a dog go through cancer treatments, inquired about Chloe. They met Chloe, decided to foster her with the hopes of adopting (we were still going through end of treatment) and Chloe finally landed in a wonderful home. Shortly afterward, they noticed Chloe started experiencing what was called "focal seizures" involving only her head and upper body. After a neurology consult, it was determined that these were not life-threatening and no further treatment was necessary. Chloe has been formally adopted by Alexandra and John and she loves, and is loved, in this happy home.

Mama Penny returned to her foster home and is comfortably caring for her kitten.
