Dear PAWS Supporter:

These past few years have been especially tumultuous times for everyone, and we thank you for your continued support. Without you, PAWS would not be able to do our work, rescuing many dogs and cats as well as serve our local community. This Pawprints wraps up 2022 with our accomplishments, continuing the mission of animal rescue and serving the community. PAWS focuses on rescuing some of the most at-risk animals which, in turn, can take more work and

time to ready these deserving rescues for their forever homes. They are all good, adoptable animals, but some may get overlooked elsewhere, perhaps because of age, looks, health, breed, or size. We pull animals from overcrowded shelters, the streets, and urgent death row situations by responding to pleas from rescue partners from other shelters, and we need to take the time required to get to know them and their true personalities so we can best match them with their human companions where they will be able to thrive. Our foster families, volunteers, kennel, sanctuary, and financial supporters enable us to rescue animals in need and provide them with veterinary care and a safe place to stay during this time. We do many private dog and cat adoptions through our website and Facebook inquiries, and many kitten and cat adoptions through our cat rescuers with whom we work.

Our veterinary and sheltering expenses far surpass what we receive in fees, so we rely on donations. Every donation – big or small – helps us save lives. There are many ways to give, including:

Starla came to us from an inner-city pound facility The poor girl was suffering from entropion, a condition where the eyelids curl into the eyes causing irritation and pain. Thankfully, RBARI, a rescue/shelter in Oakland, took care of her eyelid surgery and spay! Starla is one of the sweetest



dogs ever. She is about 5-6 years of age, very food motivated, responsive and loves her people. She will be some lucky person's best friend, walking partner, and couch potato companion. We adore Starla!

Good Samaritans found **Lucy** (below) wandering the streets alone, so they brought her into their home where she stayed for almost two months. Already with two dogs of their own and a 4-year-old child, they reached out to us when they started renovations on their home. Space already

was tight and they iust couldn't keep Lucy. They had reached out to several local shelters. but were worried that because of Lucy's



age, she would not find a home quickly enough. Shelters were full, and we had just had an adoption, so we met Lucy and knew she was a good girl whom we could help. She is smart, great with other dogs, people, pretty much anyone and anything. She is an independent gal, but loves her people. She has a lot of pep in her step, and loves walks, playing in the yard, and just hanging out. She will carry the ball the entire walk if she feels the need.

Lucy also detected an infection in one of our other rescues. While on a walk, she consistently nosed the area of her companion dog and alerted us that something was wrong. We were able to get the dog to the vet and treated and all turned out well. Lucy is medium sized and easily handled, knows basic commands, and is just waiting for that special person to bring her home and let her shine.



Cash (left) sat in a very full shelter for about 4 months when we rescued him. He is a big boy, about 75 lbs., and very silly. He adores playing in the yard, fetching objects and bringing them back to you. He will throw the object down at your feet and immediately sit waiting for a treat. He knows "down" and "paw" as well, and loves to roll over, for which he waits for treats. Cash takes meds for a hypothyroid condition, which is quite common and is easily treated without any big expense. Cash also has a limp caused by a "bum elbow" most likely due to trauma he experienced at some point in his life. He takes a supplement and an anti-inflammatory to ease any discomfort he may have, though he never displays any signs of pain. Cash is about 7 years of age, and has been waiting a long time to find his forever home. He's fun, silly and responsive, and just needs someone to fall in love with him as we all have.

Miley (right) was a stray found clean and in good condition, in an inner-city, but very

anxious. She's estimated to be about 2-3 years old, is only about 40 pounds, and sweet as can be. This poor darling is having quite a time trying to settle. She is a "velcro dog," wanting to be right by her person, and stressing out if she can't be close. We have started treating her for her anxiety and have a great trainer coming to work with her to bring out all the goodness in this petite little girl. She's friendly, gorgeous, and really needs an understanding, calm person to help her decompress and work with her, let her feel safe and loved.



Adoptable Cats










Danika, (below) a young 2-year-old dog who had been living in a crate 16 hours a day and basically ignored by the people who had




gotten her from a backyard breeder, is what we were told. Luckily, a concerned individual who saw that Danika was not in a good situation,

Our long-term fosters...We have a soft spot for the seniors The reality is that when we take in a senior who's at the older end of that broad category, we know placement into a permanent home may be hard to find. Many times, it's a medical issue that will need to be addressed, or just the regular downsides of "gettin' old." But to have the compassion to take a senior dog or cat into your home is priceless, and in some situations, we need to rely on a foster home that can commit to keeping an animal for an extended period of time, often for the lifetime of that pet. We are so grateful for these special fosterers.

In this quarter's newsletter, we highlight **Hemi, fondly renamed as "Hamilton" or "Hamz"** by his foster mom, Christina.


Hemi had been surrendered to the Newark shelter at 15 years of age, intact and with a mass on that area. Good natured, but dealing with other normal aging issues, Hemi touched the hearts of all who met him. As soon as PAWS rescuer Carole was introduced to Hemi, there was no question he was coming with her so our veterinarians could treat him. He had to go into the kennel initially, and the staff there all fell in love with him.



He slept so soundly that they often worried if he was still with us... and then, a wonderful thing happened Christina contacted us about possibly fostering Hemi after losing her cherished pit bull at age 15. She and her daughter, Adrianna, missed their dear Roxie and wanted to honor her memory by fostering a senior pittie in need. And so Hemi had the great fortune to land in their home, and there he has stayed. He successfully underwent the surgery required to remove the mass, as well as neuter, and he immediately stopped having the bleeding issues he had been experiencing.

Christina has taken the very best care of Hemi, respectful of his quirks as seniors often exhibit, and giving him everything he needs and more. There have been a few applications for Hemi, but none have been good matches. Christina and Adrianna are committed to give Hemi the best life possible. Thankfully for everyone,

Hamz has been relatively healthy and happy, and we are so very grateful for the care Christina and Adrianna are providing this sweet senior. They have a great time taking these adorable photos of "Hamz" so please enjoy!



Bobby is our featured cat for this newsletter. He recently came to PAWS after his pet parent lost their home and he was not able to go with her. Health issues have plagued him for some time now. He has been dribbling urine with some blood in spite of appropriate treatments. Recently, he became critical and was taken to an emergency and referral veterinary hospital where he was examined and treated. He made some improvements but will require continued care which may include surgery. His medical costs are rising; thus, we are making a plea for special donations to help with his medical care. We are hopeful that with continued medical care Bobby will return to normal.

On a related note: urinary issues are common in cats. Infections (UTIs), crystals and bladder stones are most common. Male cats are particularly prone to becoming blocked by the accumulation of crystals, small stones, and/or other debris. When your cat is blocked, you will see signs such as urinating only small amounts mixed with blood or making frequent but unsuccessful trips to the litterbox. Obstructions are painful for cats, and they are often life-threatening. When you see the first signs that your cat is blocked, you must get them to the veterinarian as soon as possible.

The Critical Role of Foster Homes

Fostering is very important for an organization like PAWS to rescue animals in need and to find their forever homes. Fostering increases the chance of animals to be adopted by improving their social skills. Fostering provides a safe and healthy environment for animals who need to heal, grow, or get some extra TLC while they look for homes. Fostered animals benefit from exposure to the caregiver's friends and family. The caregiver can offer trusted and enthusiastic assessments of the animal's personality and needs to better match them to a potential adopter. Fostering creates more space for animals outside of shelters. *In a nutshell, fostering saves lives.* We are very grateful to the people who foster for us.
